The Rosewood Court Historic District consists of the 100 East through 400 East blocks of Rosewood Court and "J" Street. The boundaries are Euclid Avenue to the West and Sultana Avenue to the East. There is a variety of homes on these three streets. Rosewood Court has the largest cluster of Period Revival style homes in Ontario.

HISTORY

The Rosewood Court District was originally subdivided as 5 separate tracts. The first tract was the Bell and Gimby Tract, which was subdivided in August of 1923. Shortly thereafter, the Rosewood Tract was created in February 1924. The other subdivisions were Burton's Subdivision, Emmon's Subdivision and Tract 1890. The development and popularity of the College Park neighborhood, located immediately north of this neighborhood, helped the Rosewood Court area develop.

The first home was constructed about 1925. The district developed from approximately 1925 to the beginning of World War II. The district is dominated by various Period Revival Style homes, most notably French Provincial, Tudor, and Colonial Revival. Most neighborhoods in Ontario had predominately Craftsman Bungalow style homes with some Mediterranean Revival homes mix in. Tudor, Colonial and other period style homes are rare in these neighborhoods. The fact that Revival style home exist side by side, block after block, make Rosewood Court a very unique neighborhood.

SIGNIFICANCE

The Historic District meets the following designation criteria as contained in Section 9-1.2615 of the City's Development Code:

The subdivision is 50 years old and:

1. It exemplifies or reflects special elements of the City's history.

Rosewood Court depict the growth of Ontario between World War I and II, and reflect the diverse architectural styles of the times.

2. It is identified with persons or events significant in local, state, or national history.

Many businessmen, teachers at Chaffey High School and College and ministers lived in the neighborhood.



SIGNIFICANCE CONTINUED

3. It embodies distinguishing architectural characteristics of a style, type, period, or method of construction.

Rosewood Court has one of the few and the largest group of Period Revival homes in Ontario.

4. It has a unique location, a singular physical characteristic, or isan established and familiar visual feature of a neighborhood, community or the City.

Rosewood Court is one of the most architecturally unique neighborhoods in Ontario. It location near Chaffey High School and relationship to College Park also a made it unique.

5. It is one of the few remaining examples in the City, region, state, or nation possessing distinguishing characteristics of an architectural or historical type or specimen.

It has one of the few remaining and largest clusters of Period Revival style homes in the City. Many of the homes in the tract are one of the few remaining of their style in the City.

6. Contributes to the significance of a historic area, being a geographically definable area possessing a concentration of Historic Resources or thematically related grouping of structures which contribute to each other and are unified by plan, style, or physical development.

A vast majority of the houses within the Rosewood Court Historic District would qualify for Designation as Local Historic Landmarks on their own merits.

7. Reflects significant geographical patterns, including those associated with different eras of settlement and growth, particular transportation modes, or distinctive examples of a park or community planning.

Rosewood court reflects the early development of Ontario and its transition from agricultural colony to city.
